Toonie Transportation - Town of Virden

The Toonie Transportation program will make it more affordable for seniors and individuals with mobility issues to get out, with rides offered for just a Toonie (two dollars). This service is essential for those who face financial or mobility challenges. It also aims to reduce loneliness and isolation by offering opportunities for community engagement which helps seniors stay connected and involved in local activities, improving their overall well-being.

This grant helps to subsidize the cost of operating the van without increasing user fees, ensuring the service remains affordable and sustainable. It also encourages volunteer involvement, providing more ways for the community to get engaged and help others.

This service is designed to help people take part in regular town activities, such as errands, lunch outings, card games, and exercise, especially during the winter months when mobility can be more challenging.

The Russell Binscarth Age Friendly Committee joined forces with the Russell Binscarth Toboggan Slide Committee, Binscarth Lions, Binscarth Vision 20/20, Braendle & Bruce Funeral Service, and the Municipality of Russell Binscarth to apply for the MASC / Age Friendly Community Collaboration Grant.

During the Public Age Friendly Workshop on April 25, 2023, a significant opportunity emerged: the creation of accessible tourist maps that highlight walking loops in both Russell and Binscarth for people of all ages with the objective to produce detailed community maps that feature these loops along with other local attractions, available online and as printed handouts. Additionally, 4'x6' signs equipped with QR codes linking to interactive digital maps will be placed in strategic locations. This initiative seeks to improve accessibility and encourage exploration, making the communities inviting for both residents and visitors.

Plans also include enhancing Russell Tower Hill with a shelter and picnic tables/benches, as well as upgrading the Binscarth Toboggan Slide area with a cement picnic table and additional park benches. These enhancements aim to create year-round destinations that cater to individuals of all ages, promoting physical activity and community engagement.

By investing in accessible maps and recreational areas, the goal is to foster a vibrant, inclusive atmosphere that showcases the unique offerings of Russell and Binscarth, ensuring that everyone can appreciate the benefits these beautiful communities provide.

The community is incredibly pleased to be one of the successful applicants to support this project.

The Rossburn Age Friendly Committee is very pleased to be the recipient of the Community Collaboration grant from the Manitoba Association of Senior Communities (MASC) / Age Friendly Manitoba. This funding was secured through a collaborative effort between the municipality, their local Age Friendly committee, and other local committees.

This grant will enhance the Drop-In Centre, which hosts numerous events. With this funding, they can replace the current small television used by various organizations with a 75" TV. This upgrade will allow individuals with vision impairments to fully enjoy many educational programs that come to our community. Additionally, a Movie Night has been proposed, which could help combat feelings of isolation, particularly for those living alone, by restoring much-needed socialization opportunities that are currently lacking in many areas.

Another significant purchase will be new blinds for the Drop-In Centre's windows, which still feature the original ones from 1978. The ability to darken the room will greatly benefit viewers and enhance the experience of any presentations.

This Community Collaboration Grant will enable the Rossburn Municipality, Lion's Club, Senior Resource, and any other organization interested in hosting events to utilize the new technology to educate and entertain all residents in the area.
