# Treherne Municipality - Well Seated!

The Treherne Friendship Center received the grant and they had four partners: the RM itself, M.I.L.E.S. for Seniors, the Chamber of Commerce and the Tiger Hills Community Foundation.

The Friendship Center is the social hub of the senior citizens of the Treherne area. The Center is used for a variety of educational, recreational and health focused events. They also serve a congregate meal program 5 days/week for those 55+ as well as to other vulnerable people in the area. For many, activities at the Center is their only social expression. Comfort and safety are the two prime reasons for their grant which is to cover the costs of purchasing 100 new chairs with arms. Most of the current chairs were old, rusty and many beyond repair. Chairs with arms are necessary for older adults to assist themselves in sitting and standing.

## Town of Melita - ADA Ramp Project

The Town of Melita was the recipient of a Community Collaboration Grant from the Manitoba Association of Senior Communities (MASC) under the Age Friendly Manitoba Initiative. The Melita Lions Club, Melita Banana Davs Committee, Penny Parade Committee and Melita Health Auxiliary provided letters of support to the Town in their application. The project is the installation of a new ADA-compliant ramp at the side entrance of the Melita Legion Hall. The ramp is an essential access point for many individuals, particularly seniors and those with disabilities. The ramp, in its current state poses a safety hazard due to wear and tear. The new ramp will feature sturdy railings, non-slip surfaces and a design that meets accessibility standards, ensuring a safe and smooth entry. Don Fletcher, MASC Consultant was on hand to present the \$10,000 grant on January 3, 2025 at the Town of Melita chambers.

The new ramp will encourage participation in community events, " said Fletcher. Mayor Bill Holden said the town is grateful for the support from local organizations in this initiative, which will greatly enhance the community. #### Municipality of Ste. Anne -Heartfelt Lunches



The Municipality of Ste. Anne, the Richer Young at Hearts Club, Richer Recreation Committee Inc., the Richer Métis Local and the Seine River Services for Seniors collaborated together, applied for and were awarded, the Age-Friendly Manitoba Community Collaboration Grant of \$9955 to begin "Heartfelt Lunches/Diners Chaleureux".

The lunches are held on the 4th Tuesday of the month until May and it is hoped it will continue after this initial run with other funding sources and sponsors. The lunches offer a healthy soup and sandwich and welcome 55+ residents from the Richer. Paradise Village, Town of Ste. Anne, RM of Ste Anne, and surrounding communities. It is an opportunity for community seniors to eniov a sociable lunch and at the same time learn more about what is offered in the area through the monthly introduction of a community partner. The lunch cost is being subsidized by the Age-Friendly Manitoba grant and a \$5 donation at the door by those able to donate is appreciated. Besides the lunch, accessible bus transportation is offered to those in the immediate region who have no other way to get to the luncheon, by calling the Municipality of Ste. Anne to sign up. For an inter-generational experience, an invitation will be extended to students at the Richer Elementary School to join some lunches. Local musicians will be invited to play background music contributing to a relaxing atmosphere.

We sincerely appreciate the support we received through an Age Friendly grant of \$10,000 which covers approximately half the cost of this bike. A cheque for this amount was sent to Prairie Velo in mid February as a 50% down payment and, with that, our order was placed. We are seeking other financial support through grants to cover the balance required.
